The symposium is organized by the German Program in the School of Modern Languages at the Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, GA, and focuses on Elfriede Jelinek's perspective of sustainable development. Topics include Jelinek's oeuvre and the environment, environmental pollution, environmental destruction, destruction of the Alps through tourism and skiing, deforestation, the climate crisis, climate activism, environmental protection, the use of fossil fuels, renewable energy, sustainable development, economic factors, market economy, capitalism, meat production and consumption, luxury fashion, fast fashion, gender inequality, armed conflict, wars, war refugees and climate refugees, humans and their relationship to other animals and plants as well as their role as part of and within nature. The invited scholars will explore, for example, ecofeminist approaches, material ecofeminism, ecocritical theory as well as other methodological approaches to shed more light on Jelinek's relationship to nature and sustainable development as well as her texts' take on human behavior towards nature and towards other living beings on the planet. Her plays, novels, and essays provide an entry point for this symposium.
